

## GRACE TARDY POLICY CONSEQUENCES

Preschoolers: No tardy notes will be recorded for this age group. All preschoolers are to be brought to class by the Parent or person responsible for their supervision. Teachers are encouraged to address the tardiness with the Parent. If the tardiness becomes habitual and communication with the Parent is stalled, then the Board may be asked to intervene on the Teacher's behalf.

K – 3rd Grade: 5 tardy notes (1st consequence), 10 tardy notes (2nd consequence), 15 tardy notes (3rd consequence).

4th – 6th Grade: 4 tardy notes (1st consequence), 8 tardy notes (2nd consequence), 12 tardy notes (3rd consequence).

7th – 12th Grade: 3 tardy notes (1st consequence), 6 tardy notes (2nd consequence), 9 tardy notes (3rd consequence)

### Board Consequences After Tardy Limitations Are Reached:

1st consequence: Meeting with Parent, Student and Board member to outline strategy for changing behavior.

2nd consequence: Meeting with Parent, Student and Board member to decide on restitution. Possible ideas for appropriate restitution could be G.R.A.C.E. community service, fines, formal apology, etc.

3rd consequence: A Demerit will be issued.

### Grace Period for Recording Tardiness:

No tracking or recording of tardiness will occur the first week of G.R.A.C.E. After the first week, there is a gradual phase-in of recording tardiness based on grade level. Teachers will still put "sticky" notes on the classroom doors for practice, but the Board will not record any tardy notes until the phase-in is completed.

K – 3rd Grade: No tracking for the first 3 weeks

4th – 6th Grade: No tracking for the first 2 weeks

7th – 12th Grade: No tracking for 1st week
